35 Architecture Projects Awarded for Creativity, Audacity, and Longevity

Architecture Projects Honored at Downtown Event

LOS ANGELES—Projects ranging from advertising offices to an aerial tramway, from public schools to planetariums, were awarded by the American Institute of Architects/Los Angeles Chapter in the annual awards program, known to be one of the most competitive in the country. More than 400 projects were reviewed for the Design Awards, Next/LA Awards (for unbuilt work), and the new Decade Awards. Thirty-five projects were lauded by three panels of judges coming from LA's architectural community.

The winners will be announced during the AIA National Convention, at worLd pArty, a celebration of LA architecture on June 8th, from 6:30PM-11PM, at Olvera Street. "The Entries: AIA/LA Awards Exhibition" will display all submitted projects at Southern California Institute of Architecture (SCI-Arc), 960 E. 3rd St., Los Angeles, June 7-July 10. On June 9th, the AIA/LA will host a reception to celebrate the entries of this year's Award programs, from 6 to 9 PM. That same day, at 6PM, a panel discussion, "Who Says What Architecture Is?", will discuss and debate architecture in Los Angeles.

The Design Awards jury—Thom Mayne, FAIA, Morphosis; Chris Genik, AIA, Daly Genik Architects; and Sylvia Lavin, UCLA Department of Architecture & Urban Design—gave 13 honor awards to the following projects (jurors comments follow):
